English Curriculum Statement

Why is English important?

The development of speech and a varied vocabulary is a key life skill. Competence in English enables children to communicate effectively at home, at school and in the wider world and leads to improved life opportunities. Through our class assemblies and year group performances, children are encouraged to speak and perform in front of an audience and so develop their confidence, clarity and fluency. The skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing enable children to organise and express their own thoughts and to access the knowledge and ideas of others. We believe that a secure basis in literacy skills will give our children the tools they need to participate fully as a member of society and enable them to learn and develop their knowledge and skills to their highest potential.

What is English like at St George's Central CE Primary School and Nursery?

At St George's Central CE Primary School and Nursery we believe that a quality English curriculum should develop children's love of reading, writing and discussion. We are passionate about reading and we believe that 'Reading....is a kind of magic!' We provide time for children to secure the skills to interpret texts and understand key vocabulary, in order to foster a love and passion for reading. It should inspire an appreciation of our rich and varied literary heritage and promote high standards of language and literacy by equipping pupils with a strong command of the spoken and written word. We aim to promote a positive attitude to English and engender a life-long love of language and communication by learning about literacy skills through quality children's text and books that interest, inspire and excite readers. We want our children to read easily, fluently and with good understanding. We aim to develop the habit of reading widely and often, for both pleasure and information. We recognise the importance of nurturing a culture where children take pride in their writing, can write clearly, accurately and coherently and adapt their language and style for a range of contexts, purposes and audiences.

We want to inspire our children to be confident in the art of speaking and listening, using discussion in order to learn and being able to elaborate and explain their understanding and ideas clearly, making formal presentations, demonstrating to others and participating in debate. We want to ensure that all pupils acquire a wide vocabulary, an understanding of grammar and a knowledge of linguistic conventions for reading, writing and spoken language. Using these skills, our pupils are empowered to access the whole curriculum, build upon what they already know, learn independently and prepare for the world of work and other aspects of everyday life. We work particularly hard to develop a love of literature and to enable pupils to play a full and active part in their own development in spoken language, reading and writing so that they can reach their full potential.
