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## **PUPIL PREMIUM FUNDING 2015/16**

**Funding: £128,760, Eligible Pupils: 77**

### **OVERVIEW**

The school's Pupil Premium Funding for 2015/16 is £128,760. This funding is to provide additional support to children that are entitled to, or have been entitled to, free school meals in the last six years, or children who are classed as Looked After within the Local Authority. The aim is that with this additional support their attainment is maximised and any perceived gap between them and non pupil premium children is closed.

In making provision for pupil premium children, we recognise that not all children who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged. We also recognise that not all children who are socially disadvantaged are registered for, or qualify for, free school meals. Therefore we reserve the right to allocate the pupil premium funding to support any children the school has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged.

This funding is used to provide many support systems and interventions. These fall into four broad categories:

- Addressing and assessing learning needs: phonics, spelling, grammar and reading comprehension, taught in flexible groupings.
- Addressing and assessing educational needs through specialist assessment and individualised pupil programmes (both educational and behavioural).
- Addressing and assessing social needs; accessing support for families via school based bespoke programmes such as health monitoring as well as support for attendance and punctuality.
- Providing enrichment to encourage learning and set a context for it: trips, visits, visitors, sports, art, music and practical first hand daily experience of relevant learning opportunities.

<b>Attendance and Punctuality Advisor</b>	A member of staff is directed by school to carry out an attendance assessment and address issues of poor attendance and punctuality. They offer advice and support to identified families.	Attendance and punctuality of identified children will improve, with them meeting individual targets set. <b>Small group tuition</b>	Directed by individual class teachers to support learning within class and led by experienced TAs. Identified children are able to work in small groups on objectives critical to their achievement within their year group. This includes groups for reading, writing, mathematics, phonics and speaking and listening.	The attainment gap between pupil premium and non pupil premium children in reading, writing and mathematics will close year on year.	£23,673
<b>Enrichment Activities</b>	Funding set aside to subsidise trips, visits and visitors to school to support curriculum delivery and enhance learning opportunities. This also includes a subsidy towards the annual residential at Hinning House. <b>One to One Support</b>	Specific funding allocated to enable identified children to have one to one support where possible.	Identified children make good progress in key areas, relative to their starting points. The attainment gap between them and their peers will start to close.	£27,915
<b>Extended Music Provision</b>	Funding for all children to learn an instrument in KS2 as part of the Wider Opportunities programme.	Children will be able to learn an instrument and will be exposed to this area of the curriculum fully.	£4,200
<b>Sports and Swimming</b>	This covers a contribution towards additional specialist Sports Coaching, After School Clubs and funding for swimming lessons.
