

Why might Christians describe Easter as a story of betrayal and trust?

Key Vocabulary

Trust	A firm belief in the reliability, truth, or ability of someone or something.
Betrayal	To turn your back on loyalty towards a friend or a cause, often causing harm.
Forgiveness	Putting aside feelings of resentment toward someone who has committed a wrong.
Judas Iscariot	One of the original twelve disciples who betrayed Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane.
Loyalty	A strong sense of support towards a person or a cause.
Peter	One of the original twelve disciples who denied Jesus three times.
Jerusalem	A city in Israel.
Gethsemane	The garden where Jesus prayed on the night of his betrayal and arrest.

Prior learning:

Children will have learnt about the story of Easter and some of the events of Holy Week.

Children will know about our school value of trust and why this is important to Christians and our world.

Future Learning:

Children will learn about Jesus making the ultimate sacrifice to relieve Christians from their sin and bring salvation.
