<b>Key Vocabulary</b>	
Commitment	The act of being dedicated to a cause, faith or person.
Baptism	A Christian sacrament marked by ritual use of water and admitting the person to the Christian community.
Sacred Thread Commitment	A ceremony for boys in some Hindu communities to confirm they are of an age to take on religious responsibility.
Bat Mitzvah	A religious ceremony for a Jewish girl aged twelve years and one day, regarded as the age of religious maturity.
Symbolism	The use of symbols to represent ideas or qualities.
Hinduism	A major religious and cultural tradition of South Asia, which developed from Vedic religion.
Christianity	The religion based on the person and teachings of Jesus Christ and its beliefs and practices.
Judaism	The religion developed among ancient Hebrews.


Children will have learnt about what it means to belong to a faith community and how different faiths live in our world today.
